Section A: Government and the People 1754–2000

- 1 (a) Describe the policies of Radical Reconstruction, 1866–68. [5]
- (b) Explain why political parties faced internal disagreements in the late nineteenth century. [7]
- (c) “Presidents lacked real power in the period from 1865 to 1900.” How far do you agree with this view? Explain your answer. [8]

- 2 (a) Describe the events of the Iran-Contra Affair, 1985–87. [5]
- (b) Explain why McCarthyism became a feature of American politics from 1950 to 1954. [7]
- (c) “The reform programs of Presidents Kennedy and Johnson made a real difference to the lives of ordinary Americans in the 1960s.” How far do you agree with this view? Explain your answer. [8]

Section B: Who Are Americans, 1754–2000?

- 3 (a) Describe the impact of the Black Codes passed after the Civil War. [5]
- (b) Explain how Southern states were able to restrict the rights of African Americans between 1870 and 1900. [7]
- (c) “The lives of African Americans improved from 1865 to 1900.” How far do you agree with this view? Explain your answer. [8]

- 4 (a) Describe the aims and methods of the Industrial Workers of the World in the early twentieth century. [5]
- (b) Explain why “yellow dog” contracts were used by employers before 1932. [7]
- (c) “Labor unions achieved their aims in the period from 1918 to 1948.” How far do you agree with this view? Explain your answer. [8]

Section C: Economic and Social Change 1754–2000

- 5 (a) What was the importance of the Missouri Compromise of 1820? [5]
- (b) Explain how the actions of John Brown increased sectional tensions before the Civil War. [7]
- (c) “The Civil War was primarily caused by sectional divisions over slavery.” How far do you agree with this view? Explain your answer. [8]
- 6 (a) What was meant by the term “buying on the margin”? [5]
- (b) Explain why over-production became a problem during the 1920s. [7]
- (c) “The boom of the 1920s had a positive impact on the lives of all Americans.” How far do you agree with this view? Explain your answer. [8]

Section D: The U.S.A. and the World 1754–2000

- 7 (a) Describe the aims of the Monroe Doctrine of 1823. [5]
- (b) Explain why the United States wanted to build the Panama Canal. [7]
- (c) “U.S. relations with European countries improved from 1820 to 1900.” How far do you agree with this view? Explain your answer. [8]
- 8 (a) What were the aims of the International Labor Organization when it was first founded? [5]
- (b) Explain how the U.S.A. tried to secure international peace in the 1920s. [7]
- (c) “The U.S.A. was a ‘Good Neighbor’ from 1933 to 1941.” How far do you agree with this view? Explain your answer. [8]

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
