- (b) *in somnis ... tumentes* (lines 3–6): how does Virgil make his description vivid in these lines? You should discuss both what he says and how he says it, quoting Latin in your answer. [4]
- (c) *ei mihi ... patrios* (lines 7–12): how does Virgil create pathos in these lines? [4]
- (d) Translate lines 12–15 (*ultro flens ... morae*). [5]

 - (ii) what was its final destination? [1]
 - (iii) what do you think this destination might be suggesting to Aeneas and Anchises? [1]
- (d) *nepotem* (line 16): name him. [1]
- (e) *iam iam ... Troia est* (lines 15–17): for what reasons does Virgil use repetition of words in these lines? [3]

 - (ii) why is the *aerarium* described as *commune*? [1]
- (d) *quae omnis ... translata est* (lines 4–5): what happened to the money later? [1]
- (e) *hic qua ... reliquerit* (lines 5–7): explain in your own words the contrast that Nepos is making in this sentence. [4]
- (f) Translate lines 7–9 (*quo factum ... expulsus*). [5]

- (d) *cum fortiores ... mutat* (lines 3–7): how does Seneca make this a vivid description of what went on at the bath house? Make **two** points and support your answer with evidence from these lines. [4]
- (e) Translate lines 7–10 (*si vero ... saliunt*). [5]
- (f) *iam biberari ... vendentes* (lines 10–12): give **two** examples of the sort of *mercem* referred to in these lines. [2]
