Caesar Corfinii portas murosque custodiri iubet. milites ponit, non spatiis intermissis, ut erat consuetudo, sed uno agmine, ut se murum faciant, atque totam civitatem spectent; milites suos circummittit atque eis imperat, non modo ut ab eruptionibus caveant, sed etiam quorundam hominum occultos exitus prohibeant. Lentulus media nocte de muro cum custodibus nostris colloquitur: velle, si licet, Caesarem convenire. facta potestate ex oppido educitur, neque eum custodes relinquunt, priusquam ad Caesarem adfertur. orat ut sibi parcat veteremque amicitiam in animo habeat. Lentulus, ut in oppidum reverti liceat, petit; facta potestate discedit. Caesar, prima luce, omnes senatores senatorumque liberos, legatos et equites Romanos ex urbe ad se produci iubet. hos omnes productos a contumeliis militum prohibet; apud eos pauca loquitur, et dimittit omnes incolumes. Lentulo reddit magnam pecuniam, quam attulerat ille atque in oppido deposuerat, ne liberior in vitis hominum quam in pecunia fuisse videatur. milites Lentuli sacramentum apud se dicere iubet atque eodem die castra movet et, itinere confecto, in Apuliam pervenit.
